

## [ODIHR Publishes 2016 Hate Crime Data](#) **[1]**

16 November 2017

Marking the International Day for Tolerance, ODIHR is publishing its hate crime data for 2016. Find out more here.

The 2016 data include information on 44 participating States, including disaggregated official hate crime statistics for 18 countries and a detailed overview of how 34 participating States process and record hate crimes. We changed how official data is presented and users can now download official data.

This is complemented by hate incidents in 48 participating States as reported by 125 civil society groups, the UNHRC and OSCE field operations. Incident information can also be downloaded.

## Disaggregated incident data

For the first time, incident data reported by these sources can be comprehensively searched, filtered and downloaded. This can be done by country, by bias motivation and by type of incident.

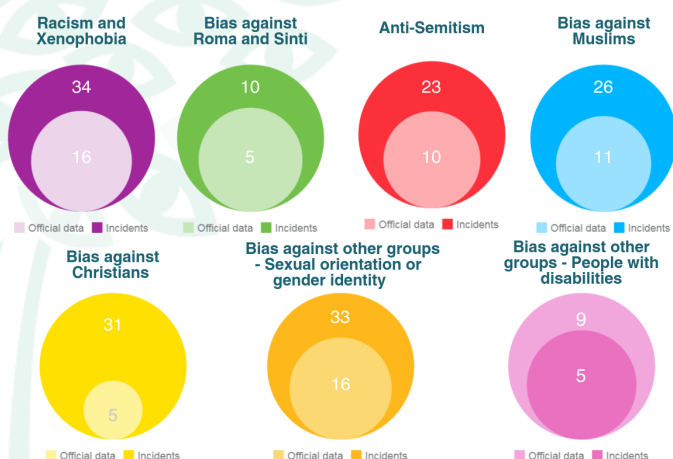
## 2016 Hate Crime Data Key Findings

### Overview of Contributions



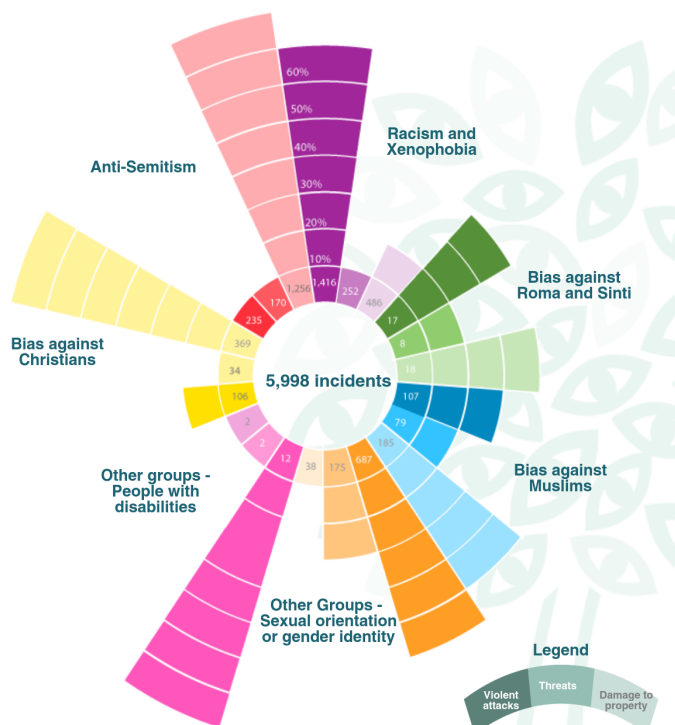
### Data coverage by bias motivation

Number of states for which there are official data and hate incidents reported by other sources per bias motivation.



### Overview of incidents

The graphic below shows incidents that took place in 2016 reported by civil society, the UNHCR, OSCE field operations and the Holy See. It is divided by bias motivation and shows the ratio of each type of incident (violent attacks against people, threats, and attacks against property).



This graphic is based on information reported to ODIHR. It does not fully reflect the prevalence of hate crimes in the OSCE area. Data are not comparable across countries or bias motivations, as the level of reporting and methodologies vary. This graph excludes 4 incidents committed against members of other religions.
