Summary

Albania last reported information on hate crimes to ODIHR for the 2024 Hate Crime Report. In co-operation with the OSCE Presence in Albania, Albania has trained law enforcement officers on hate crimes. Following an ODIHR workshop held in 2017, Albania made improvements to its hate crime data recording system, enabling the identification of biased motivations in recorded cases.

In 2021, Albania introduced the National Gender Equality Strategy 2021-2030, which includes specific measures to combat discrimination and hate crimes and promote equality and social inclusion.

In 2024, Albania introduced the Crime Victims Protection Strategy 2024-2030.

ODIHR's Key Observation

ODIHR observes that Albania has not periodically reported to ODIHR the numbers of hate crimes recorded by police.



Official Data

Thirteen further incidents were reported as registered by the police, but which represent criminal forms of hate speech and fall outside of the scope of the OSCE hate crime definition.

National Developments

The Sector for Criminal Statistics at the General Directorate of State Police added a column in the crime statistics, defining the motive for all crimes committed, in order to clearly identify the bias motive in recorded cases.


In May, ODIHR, together with the OSCE Presence, Prosecutor's Office, the Police and several civil society organizations, organized a one-day workshop on improving the police recording of hate crimes. The workshop resulted in 12 recommendations to the Albanian authorities, including the above action.

A module on hate crime has been included in the curricula of the Security Academy at the Bachelor level, as part of a course on elements of crimes, interviewing and investigation.

The OSCE Presence organized training sessions on hate crimes for the police in seven police regions across the country.
